WHAT IS EVANSTON SCHOLARS?

Evanston Scholars is a non-profit organization that:

- Improves college access and success for a diverse group of ambitious, underserved Evanston high school students.
- Starts with the admissions process and continues through college graduation.
- Offers mentors, workshops, campus visits, and ACT preparation to students lacking financial, academic, family and/or community resources.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

AUGUST 2013 – JULY 2014

COLLEGE ACCESS – FINDING A "GOOD FIT" SCHOOL

- Juniors took a five-week **ACT preparation** course.
- Scholars went on three **college visits** to schools representing a variety of campus experiences; this year we visited the University of Iowa, Augustana College, and Lawrence University.
- 20 of our 27 rising senior Scholars participated in **summer college programs** at schools across the country including Brown University, Loyola University, and the University of Missouri.
- We held eleven **workshops** on topics including applications and essays, financial aid, preparing for college, budgeting time and finances, health and wellness, and first-semester planning.

COLLEGE SUCCESS – A SUPPORT SYSTEM THROUGH THE COLLEGE YEARS

- Our **mentoring** program provides a structured, ongoing six-year relationship that supports students through all steps on the path to college graduation.
- Community building events bring Scholars, mentors, families, and staff together to develop the support system that will stay with Scholars through their college years.

As a high school junior,
Anamaria had what on paper
was the perfect profile of a
college bound student. She
worked hard, earned good grades,
was on the cross-country team, and
volunteered on TeamASAP, where
she helped motivate underclassmen
to take AP courses. Still, Anamaria
did not believe she was truly college
bound. No one in her family had

ever gone to college, and the thought of it seemed unrealistic – at most she thought she might enroll in a junior college.

When she joined Evanston Scholars, Anamaria's inherent optimism was unleashed. With a new sense of determination, she went to work turning her high school successes into a future that included a college degree. She took advantage of every opportunity provided by Evanston Scholars: visiting colleges, revising her essays, taking and re-taking the ACT, and forming a close bond with her mentor. The summer before senior year, she traveled to Rhode Island to attend a summer college program at Brown University. By winter break, she had already applied to 11 colleges. Within Evanston Scholars, her optimism was contagious as she became known for wearing Hello Kitty, the color pink, and bows for good luck

Anamaria is now a freshman with a proposed major in elementary education at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Her hard work and dedication earned her the President's Award Scholarship – a full-tuition award. She reports "My transition to college is going a lot better than expected! MENTORING

Every young person needs a support system...especially when it comes to succeeding in college. Evanston Scholars mentors provide a critical layer of support to our ambitious students, most of whom will be the first in their families to go to college.

Spanning the full six years of the Evanston Scholars program, the one-to-one mentor relationships provide the guidance Scholars need throughout their college journey. Supported by Evanston Scholars staff, mentors help their students apply for colleges, fill out the FAFSA student aid forms, research scholarship opportunities, and evaluate offers. Once in college, mentors provide additional emotional support to help Scholars adapt to college life and overcome obstacles as they arise.
